(Thereupon, the following was heard on Tape 1, Side 1.)

INVESTIGATOR GARDNER: Okay. Before we get started, I just (inaudible) last week so we don't have to go through so much information.

I just want to update a couple things.

First of all, (inaudible).

MR. MISTLER: (Inaudible).

INVESTIGATOR GARDNER: Just to reiterate what was on that, the one thing is we'll be making a tape of what will go on here today so we have a permanent record, just like we did before.

MR. MISTLER: Yes.

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INVESTIGATOR GARDNER: Okay. Just in the matter of your background, just to see if we need to -- just to confirm that there's no problems. 'Cause you look as health as you did last week.

MR. MISTLER: Yeah.

INVESTIGATOR GARDNER: Have you had any physical disorders in the last week?

MR. MISTLER: No.

INVESTIGATOR GARDNER: You haven't. Okay.

Any injuries of any type?

MR. MISTLER: No.

INVESTIGATOR GARDNER: Have you begun taking any

medication that you weren't taking before? 1 You were taking Tenormin and Lozol last week. MR. MISTLER: I'm still taking that. INVESTIGATOR GARDNER: Anything else? MR. MISTLER: No. 5 INVESTIGATOR GARDNER: Okay. And I'll make the jump, that you have not had anything to drink since 8 last week. MR. MISTLER: What do you --9 10 INVESTIGATOR GARDNER: Any alcoholic beverages. MR. MISTLER: No. I haven't for twenty-one years. 11 12 INVESTIGATOR GARDNER: Right. MR. MISTLER: I'd lose my designated driver 13 status. 14 15 INVESTIGATOR GARDNER: Okay. And have you used 16 any drugs besides marijuana in the last week and a half? 17 MR. MISTLER: On Sunday I had some marijuana. 18 INVESTIGATOR GARDNER: Okay. 19 MR. MISTLER: Since Sunday nothing. 20 21 INVESTIGATOR GARDNER: How about before Sunday, 22 between -- I think we met last week it was on Tuesday, 23 if I remember correctly. 24 I believe so, yeah. MR. MISTLER: 25 INVESTIGATOR GARDNER: Okay. From Tuesday, to the time you left here Tuesday afternoon, around noon-time, Sunday's the last time you had some marijuana?

MR. MISTLER: Yeah.

INVESTIGATOR GARDNER: How many other days last week have you had --

MR. MISTLER: Probably every day.

INVESTIGATOR GARDNER: Every day?

MR. MISTLER: Uh-huh.

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INVESTIGATOR GARDNER: Okay. And when you -- when you say you have marijuana, are you having just a couple of joints in the evening or all day or --

MR. MISTLER: Oh, no, it's usually in the evening.

INVESTIGATOR GARDNER: Okay.

MR. MISTLER: Not that -- I mean, on Saturday I might, you know, smoke one in the afternoon or something.

INVESTIGATOR GARDNER: But there has been no other drug use besides marijuana; is that correct?

MR. MISTLER: No, I haven't -- I did cocaine maybe ten -- ten years ago or something like that.

INVESTIGATOR GARDNER: Right.

MR. MISTLER: Not very often even on that.

INVESTIGATOR GARDNER: Okay. Okay. I just want to run through the case facts just -- I want to go through it briefly. And the issues -- As I understand

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Let's go through it briefly, real quick.

You were -- You were in the area of Sears on July 27th, 1981.

MR. MISTLER: The last Monday of July.

INVESTIGATOR GARDNER: Okay. So we know -- We'll use July '81 then for the purposes of the question -- MR. MISTLER: Right.

INVESTIGATOR GARDNER: -- so there's no hang-up at all on the exact date.

Okay. And at that time you were stuck in traffic behind a lady, who you eventually found out was waiting for another car to pull out of a spot and you were stuck there six, eight minutes and during that time, some really weird guy in a black over white, 1971 Cadillac, pulled up in the opposite direction you were facing pretty near to right beside you.

He got out of the car --

MR. MISTLER: The front of his car would have been with the front of her car.

INVESTIGATOR GARDNER: Okay.

MR. MISTLER: The lady in front of me.

INVESTIGATOR GARDNER: So he was about a car length or so ahead of you.

MR. MISTLER: Right. And it's possible --

INVESTIGATOR GARDNER: Facing your direction.

MR. MISTLER: Right. And it's a possibility that that vinyl roof might have been a dark green. I told Ralph that on that --

INVESTIGATOR GARDNER: Okay.

MR. MISTLER: -- I believe it's on that Saturday.

It may have been a dark green or a black. I'll say

black, because I think -- But, you know.

INVESTIGATOR GARDNER: We'll use dark over white,
I don't want to --

MR. MISTLER: Okay. Dark over white. It was definitely a white Cadillac four-door.

INVESTIGATOR GARDNER: Okay. I don't want any conflict.

It had a dark top, you're sure it was a dark top?

MR. MISTLER: Yeah, it was dark in color, it's

just I'm not a hundred percent one or the other. I

believe on my statement I gave the police I probably

said black, but there is a possibility it may have been

a dark green --

INVESTIGATOR GARDNER: Okay.

MR. MISTLER: -- top, but I told the detectives that, also.

INVESTIGATOR GARDNER: Okay. So we got this -- we got this really strange guy gets out of a dark over

white 1971 Cadillac --

MR. MISTLER: '71 or '72, they're identical.

INVESTIGATOR GARDNER: Okay. And he puts a shirt on, gets out of the car, he makes eye contact with you. His one eye drifts over to these kids.

He ends up going over, crouching down and talking to this one little boy. And after a period of time, he ends up walking that little boy over to his car. No sign of struggle or anything.

He puts the little boy in his car, you go -MR. MISTLER: Adam got in his car on his own, I
mean, he didn't pick him up and put him in there.
INVESTIGATOR GARDNER: Okay.

MR. MISTLER: And at one point he was standing alongside of him on the curb, I guess facing west -INVESTIGATOR GARDNER: Right.

MR. MISTLER: -- which would have been facing towards me.

INVESTIGATOR GARDNER: Uh-huh.

MR. MISTLER: Later on I started to pull off, but I looked in my mirror and I had a great big like -- I think they call them California mirrors --

INVESTIGATOR GARDNER: Right

MR. MISTLER: -- and I looked in my mirror and I could see his back, because he had bent over. I

thought they had both went back inside. I started to pull off, and I took one last glance in the mirror -- INVESTIGATOR GARDNER: Uh-huh.

MR. MISTLER: -- and I saw his back. And he was -- he would have been down like this. If this was the hood of the car --

INVESTIGATOR GARDNER: Right.

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MR. MISTLER: -- he would have been down like this, so his back was, you know, I mean --

INVESTIGATOR GARDNER: Level with the car.

MR. MISTLER: -- level with the car, yeah.

And apparently Adam was standing right there. I couldn't see Adam at all --

INVESTIGATOR GARDNER: Okay.

MR. MISTLER: -- at that point, I could only see Otis' back.

And I was still frozen at that point, you might say, you know. My body was shaking so bad. You know, at one point I wanted to take my hand off the shift lever, and I couldn't do that, and that even made it worse, you know, then my body really, I mean, it just — I couldn't move.

INVESTIGATOR GARDNER: Uh-huh.

MR. MISTLER: And I wasn't really sure why I couldn't move, you know, I knew it had to do something

with the kid, you know. I didn't think I was having a heart attack or anything like that. It was -- You know, I couldn't explain that. You know, it was just my gut feeling kept telling me there's something wrong, there's something wrong.

INVESTIGATOR GARDNER: Right.

MR. MISTLER: And my eyes kept saying, you know, what is it, what is it, you know.

And then after he was back, you know, like that, that sort of unlocked me, you know.

INVESTIGATOR GARDNER: Uh-huh.

MR. MISTLER: Then by that time I had moved back

-- I'd started to pull away, and I'd moved to where his
tag would have been right there, like only a few feet,
you know, over from where I'm at.

And that's when I caught a glimpse of his back and I stopped again.

INVESTIGATOR GARDNER: Uh-huh.

MR. MISTLER: And I sit there maybe two minutes and then they start walking around the car, you know.

INVESTIGATOR GARDNER: Was there still traffic lined up behind you at that point?

MR. MISTLER: Oh, the whole parking lot was packed. I mean, nobody was going anywhere until I moved or until this old lady moved first. And then

until I moved.

INVESTIGATOR GARDNER: Well, she had already moved a couple car lengths for you to get up there, right?

MR. MISTLER: But she eventually moved away, right.

INVESTIGATOR GARDNER: Right.

MR. MISTLER: And I was down there, so now I was on the point, you know, I was up there and nobody was gonna move. Because what had happened, the other cars had started come up where they should have been exiting and even coming around the side of the building, I could see the nose of one car, you know, like the regular lane would have been here, well, this would have been the lane that you would have gone this way. But now there was a car with its nose coming out this way.

INVESTIGATOR GARDNER: Uh-huh.

MR. MISTLER: And back here were two lanes coming up, one that would come this way and the other would let you exit. Well, people would come up both sides there and that was packed. Now they were trying to all back up and the line went all the way around.

There used to be a post office, like a little mobile -- not a mobile post office, but it was -- it used to have a little post office there in Sears lot.

INVESTIGATOR GARDNER: Let me ask you to draw this for me, okay. Let me see what you're talking about.

Let me get you a pen.

MR. MISTLER: A pencil would be better.

This is the sidewalk. This would be the garden supply -- like a walkway through here.

INVESTIGATOR GARDNER: Uh-huh.

MR. MISTLER: You would have walked through and there would have been plants and there would have been things in here.

And the actual door for Sears was in here.

When I first saw Adam, he was standing -- there was a lady here and there was about a fourteen year old girl there.

When I first saw Adam, he was standing maybe eight or ten foot away from her and there were four other boys with him, there were five boys, because I remember saying, Jesus Christ, five boys, you know, I got one boy who drives me crazy, you know, how the hell she do it with five boys, she got that other girl, six kids, but five boys.

And then I looked back -- I would have been -This is the -- Let's say this is the -- I don't think
they -- Well, there may have been a line on down
through there.

Otis' car would have been right here.

And originally the old lady's car would have been right here, where the two fronts are straight across from each other.

INVESTIGATOR GARDNER: Uh-huh.

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MR. MISTLER: I was in my pickup truck, which would have been back here. That's where I'd seen the boys --

INVESTIGATOR GARDNER: Before we go any further, just for my clarification, when you drew the line here, does the street go around right here?

MR. MISTLER: No, actually what it would have went down maybe a little bit further.

INVESTIGATOR GARDNER: Okay. What happens over here, does the sidewalk go --

MR. MISTLER: The sidewalk followed the building around.

INVESTIGATOR GARDNER: Okay.

MR. MISTLER: And they had package pickup --

INVESTIGATOR GARDNER: Okay.

MR. MISTLER: -- here. There would have been another like two lanes here.

INVESTIGATOR GARDNER: Okay.

MR. MISTLER: If I remember correctly, I think the sidewalk continued around here, but it wasn't as thick

as this section.

INVESTIGATOR GARDNER: All right.

MR. MISTLER: So this would have been like the sidewalk. Say that's the yellow line.

This would have been, if you were coming down here, you'd want to go here for package pickup, you would have made the turn here. There was a stop sign here and I could see the front-end of this car here, and at one time another car came around and his front-end was sticking out here.

INVESTIGATOR GARDNER: Okay.

MR. MISTLER: He's one of them special people that just didn't want to wait.

Back here --

INVESTIGATOR GARDNER: How far does it go to the street there approximately?

MR. MISTLER: From here out to the --

INVESTIGATOR GARDNER: No, from here behind you, how many cars were backed up in here before you get to the street?

MR. MISTLER: Oh, seventeen, twenty, maybe thirty.

INVESTIGATOR GARDNER: Okay. All right. Let's
just --

MR. MISTLER: Maybe more.

INVESTIGATOR GARDNER: Let me get this straight.

There's one lane -- There's room for one lane of traffic coming this way and one lane of traffic coming that way?

MR. MISTLER: Yeah, and then -- then you would have had, let's see, you would have had like -- These would be parking places here. There would be like an entrance that went here --

INVESTIGATOR GARDNER: Right.

MR. MISTLER: -- there'd be another entrance that went here, another entrance that went here, and then on down. And this would have been the other door, which would have been on the south side of that building.

INVESTIGATOR GARDNER: Okay. Just let me clarify. This is just for me.

MR. MISTLER: No, I understand.

INVESTIGATOR GARDNER: Now, as I remember from the other day, you said that this woman stopped and you're talking six to eight minutes --

MR. MISTLER: Oh, at least. At least six to eight minutes.

INVESTIGATOR GARDNER: Okay.

MR. MISTLER: It may have even been longer than that.

INVESTIGATOR GARDNER: Okay. And that's why you were -- Before she started moving at all, you figure,

or during this whole time -- through the whole time period?

MR. MISTLER: I didn't -- I'm sorry.

INVESTIGATOR GARDNER: Were you -- Were you -- Was traffic --

MR. MISTLER: She was here probably a good eight
-- I mean, eight minutes is a long time to be sitting
in, you know, it could have been six or eight.

INVESTIGATOR GARDNER: Okay. But then when she eventually moved and then you --

MR. MISTLER: What she was doing, apparently, she was waiting for a space to come open here.

INVESTIGATOR GARDNER: Okay.

MR. MISTLER: You know, they would have hit spaces along this side and this side.

She was determined she was gonna get one of these spaces.

When I was sitting behind her, you know, I couldn't understand why she was sitting there and I kept kinda like looking around, you know, trying to see maybe she hit a dog or maybe there was something laying in front of her car that, you know, kept her from moving, you know. Maybe like a shopping cart or something.

INVESTIGATOR GARDNER: Uh-huh.

MR. MISTLER: And, you know, if that were the case, I would have gone up and moved it, you know.

INVESTIGATOR GARDNER:

MR. MISTLER: So I kept kinda looking around, I couldn't understand why she was sitting there and I had sit there, and up to that point, traffic kept coming down here, a car or two at a time and there wouldn't have been much traffic this way, because this row was the only thing that was open is where Otis was coming, you know, down this way.

Right.

And I sit there and then I started to pull out and just go around her, because I gotten a break from the traffic coming this way. There wasn't a whole lot, but there was just enough to keep me pinned behind her, you know, and that was just at the last maybe fifteen or twenty seconds of that six or eight minutes, 'cause up till then I was just kinda sitting there laughing that this old lady's just -- she's not gonna move. She's gonna wait, you know, and I think what she's doing is she's waiting to go into this space here.

INVESTIGATOR GARDNER: Uh-huh.

MR. MISTLER: That, or there's something in front of her car blocking her car.

And as I'm about to just go on around her, I look and I see this Cadillac coming down, which was Otis,

and he was coming down here and he was going slow, too, because I kept wanting to go around and I said, well, I'll wait for this guy to go by and I'm waiting and waiting and I figure, well, he's gonna go by but he doesn't, he stops right here, which would have been — this would have been the front of her car.

INVESTIGATOR GARDNER: Uh-huh.

MR. MISTLER: And this is his car, and he stops right there. Now, I'm still right back there.

Now, I think maybe she did hit something and this guy's getting out to help her.

So I look up between the cars and I'm watching them to see -- and I fully expected him to go to the front of her car and maybe move a shopping cart or something like that.

But he didn't do that.

He got out of the car, put his shirt on and this shirt had like a brown spot here and it had like -- when I went to high school they used to have gold ropes that the band wore. Well, he didn't have gold ropes, but the sweat from the perspiration, it almost looked like, you know, like gold ropes going around.

I mean, they weren't ropes their self, but you know what I mean, the color, and around the neck and that from the sweat he had like a -- it's like a yellow

ring. I mean, you know, this shirt was like yellow.

And he got out and he put this shirt on and I'm sitting there and just watching him and I'm only a few, you know, really a few feet away from him.

INVESTIGATOR GARDNER: Uh-huh.

MR. MISTLER: And then I thought he was gonna walk up to this lady's car and say something to her, maybe he knew her or maybe she -- you know, maybe her motor had quit, you know, or for whatever reason.

So I'm watching him, and as he goes past this old lady, she reaches over and pushes down on the -- the door lock.

INVESTIGATOR GARDNER: Uh-huh.

MR. MISTLER: She must have pushed it down because at first I thought maybe she was opening it up 'cause she knew him. But he didn't even look at her, he started walking up between there, you know, alongside of his car, he left his car door open, the front door was open, he walked around that and start walking up and just start doing this as he was walking up.

And on -- He was facing, it would have been this side of his head, it's like if you sleep on your hair, you know how it goes up.

INVESTIGATOR GARDNER: Uh-huh.

MR. MISTLER: It looked like -- literally like a

little plate of hair. In other words, I mean, if you took your hair and you laid and you slept on this all night and you got up, your hair would still be sticking straight up.

But this was almost a perfect circle like.

So that's the first thing that caught my attention and he's doing this and I'm kinda looking at that and I'm looking at this shirt and then he finally sees me and he goes like this. Just like that.

And then he smiled at me as he's turning this way. He give me a big smile and he had these green teeth.

And I couldn't believe what I was seeing.

My first impression when his head stopped was upright animal, mini-big foot, circus. Before I could analyze it anymore or think about it anymore, then he smiled. And I've seen -- I've never seen green teeth like this in my life. It reminded me of Justin McKnight, a kid I went to -- I was probably in the eighth -- seven, eight years old in school and a kid transferred in, his brother transferred in and they both had green teeth. Well, you know, as an eight year old, I thought that that was really neat, you know.

And I thought of Jessie McKnight. I hadn't thought of him since -- hell, I was eight years old or so. And then I thought of Christmas because even

though his hair looked brown in the sunlight, with his beard and the rest of his hair sticking like up, I mean, you know, you're talking bad hair, this was just like frizzied all up, you know.

And you could see the red in his hair. I mean, if he was sitting in the room with us, you'd think he had brown hair and that, but it has like a red tint to it, you understand what I'm saying?

INVESTIGATOR GARDNER: Yeah.

MR. MISTLER: Okay. So I thought of Christmas because I had looked at Adam, and Adam had had -- and when Adam was standing there with the boys and then when he was standing there by himself, I kept looking, he had these real wild pair of pants on, it was green pants, but it had like -- I believe the other two colors were orange -- orange and yellow, pants and they were way too big. You know, like you buy clothes for your kids and you buy them a little bit big. These were way too big on him.

And this hat he had on, it had to have been an adult hat because I've seen the picture of him in the paper, it was a hat like that, red and it had the white on there, I can't say that I remember the C, but I remember a logo or something on this red hat.

And this hat he had on came right down to here and

it was still too big on him, I mean, even if it had been, you know, adjusted up, it still was way too big. It probably was an adult hat from that same ball club.

He was standing there -- And oh, and then the notice came there and he's smiling like this, he's turning. His eyes did this. His one eye went over, you know, he was starting to look to the curb, but his one eye went over at first.

INVESTIGATOR GARDNER: Hum.

MR. MISTLER: Now, I'm thinking Christmas and I'm trying to analyze what the hell I'm still even looking at that and I can't even do that because now this guy did eye tricks. I was thinking, holy shit, eye tricks.

At this point if he would have vaporized, I wouldn't have been any more shocked than I was right now.

Now, my thought goes from I hope to hell this old lady moves is what I was thinking before, to now I hope she just stays where she's at.

So she stayed right there, she's still sitting there. And he went over to the curb and Adam -- the five, four other boys had walked away. I don't know where they went. I think I remember seeing one drifting around there, but I have no idea where the other four went.

Adam went from here to where he stood right next to this lady and this fourteen year old. And this lady is digging in her purse with her right hand, she's digging in her purse, she's just digging, I mean she's digging. You know, she's going through this purse just digging.

I'm still here, this old lady's still here. And I'm watching. Now Otis comes here and now he's on the street, but he doesn't touch the kid, he like crouches down and he's only about two feet away from the kid's face. Now he's eye level with the kid and he's like a catcher would kneel down. He's eye level with the kid.

And I'm sitting there and I'm waiting to see this lady's reaction, because I know if it was my kid, the first thing I would do is look down and seen this guy, I would have pulled my kid back.

So now I'm waiting, saying this lady's gonna shit when she sees what's talking with her. And she kept digging and digging and digging. So finally she stops digging and she looks down and Otis had to be -- his face had to be just like here, because Adam was standing only a few feet away from her.

And when she had no reaction, I said she knows him, you know, it's kinda like Uncle Buck, you know, he always looks weird, but he's an all right guy or

something.

But I figured she knew him because she had no reaction at all, like, oh, you know, pull your kid away from him now.

So I just kept watching that. She just kept digging and digging and digging. Finally this lady moves and I think I must have looked back here to where the post office see exactly how far the traffic had gone now. Now it had gone all the way to the street, and people that were trying to make the turn in on the yellow — on the green light were stuck in the middle of the street, too. And I'm just kinda like laughing. You know, this old lady's got this whole parking lot, you know, blocked up and I'm looking back and then I looked up and she had pulled away.

Well, when she did, I let the clutch out, and as the truck's rolling, I remember the -- the weird guy and the kid. And I just took a glance back over, and when I did, I saw that this lady and this fourteen year old weren't around. And something just kinda like took over my body like shook and that. And, you know, it's getting like worse.

Like my gut was saying there's something wrong, there's something wrong, you know. But what's wrong. You know, he's -- there's no law against being ugly,

you know. And something just told me that there's something wrong.

So I slammed on the brakes and now by this time my car would have been here, my truck rather. I guess I would have been about where the back of his door ended on that four-door and I could look into his car and see his, you know, interior and that. And inside of there he had like -- if you've ever slept in your car, you'd pile stuff up, the same way a dog does, he piles, you know, like stuff up. It looked like the guy had been living in his car, because there was wrappers and bags and, you know, it looked like twinkie wrappers, I don't know that it was twinkie wrappers, but you know what I mean?

INVESTIGATOR GARDNER: Uh-huh.

MR. MISTLER: Some of them laying around.

And he had some of the -- I don't know if they were pillows, but they may have been like a blanket or some towels or something where he had probably had used that to sleep, because probably would have fit, you know, this perfectly sleeping in there.

So now I'm here and I'm looking in this car and I can't really get a good view through because I have to look through his windshield, but I can still see the kid and him. When I had pulled off, he had gone up

onto the curb and he was standing next to the kid on the curb.

INVESTIGATOR GARDNER: Uh-huh.

MR. MISTLER: When I let the clutch out and took off rolling. And he was standing next to the kid on the curb --

INVESTIGATOR GARDNER: Standing up or still crouching down?

MR. MISTLER: No, he was standing up now, and he would have been, if you were the kid, I would have been, you know, they were just like standing across from each other.

INVESTIGATOR GARDNER: Uh-huh.

MR. MISTLER: He took his arm and this is what caught my eye and probably got my body shaking, was I had just caught that out of my eye, he didn't reach down and grab the kid's --

Like stand up, maybe I can show you better.

If you were Adam and I'm Otis and I'm standing next to you, what he did was he was he took this hand and he put his hand up there like that.

INVESTIGATOR GARDNER: Uh-huh.

MR. MISTLER: And that's when I had saw when I had pulled forward and that's what made me shake.

INVESTIGATOR GARDNER: Okay.

MR. MISTLER: Now, I look around for that lady and that fourteen year old, 'cause I want to get out of the truck and say, do you know this man, you know.

And I looked all around and I couldn't see them. They had to have gone back inside, there was no way they could have walked away from my eyesight in that short of a period of time.

So now he's standing alongside of him on the curb, these two are gone, those five boys -- the other four boys are gone.

INVESTIGATOR GARDNER: Were all of those people white --

MR. MISTLER: Yeah.

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INVESTIGATOR GARDNER: -- all of the boys?

MR. MISTLER: Yeah, all the boys were white. They looked like brothers. Yeah.

INVESTIGATOR GARDNER: Okay.

MR. MISTLER: I mean, not necessarily that they all looked facially alike, but it would have been like steps.

INVESTIGATOR GARDNER: Uh-huh.

MR. MISTLER: Adam being the smallest and then it would have just been like steps, you know.

INVESTIGATOR GARDNER: Okay.

MR. MISTLER: Now, the two of them are standing on

the curb here. I'm still right here where it's really tough for me to see, you know, what's going on there.

And I'm trying to rationalize, wait a minute, maybe he's here to pick that lady up because now they're both just standing on the curb.

They should have done been around the front of that car and down through there by now, but they weren't. They were just standing on the curb there.

And so now I'm like saying to myself, wait a minute, you know, he just came to pick her up and it's, you know, she knows him, and she had to go back in the store for something, you know. There's no problem.

But my gut kept saying, there's a problem, there's something wrong here.

So they stood on that curb like that for, oh, had to be a good three minutes. But when I had thought, wait a minute, I'm trying to rationalize, you know, why wouldn't, you know, why didn't -- you know, of course she knew him. He pulled up there to pick him up, she forgot her credit card or something, went back in the store. And they're gonna come back out.

And then I looked into the car and there was so much stuff piled up in that car, there was no way that he could have put them in the car.

INVESTIGATOR GARDNER: Uh-huh.

MR. MISTLER: Because he had the back seat was filled with stuff and on the other side of the back -- in the back, you'd see the handles from different lawn equipment and stuff, you know, sitting back, you know, on the back -- in the back. He had two of them you trim trees with, one had a rope, one didn't have a rope. And one was in each direction, because when Adam had got into the car, I remember thinking, you know, watch out, pop, you forgot about your saws there, you know.

And the one was pointed towards him. But that would have been laying on the dashboard, the saw parts of them, the wood handles would have been laying back over the seat. And then on the other side of the car, the handles -- I seen a lot of handles and stuff. But there was clothes just piled up, clothes and all kinds of -- looked like just clothes, you know.

And they were as high as the back of his seat, you know, there. So there was no way this woman and this fourteen year could have got in this car.

INVESTIGATOR GARDNER: Uh-huh.

MR. MISTLER: And that's when my body even began to shake more, because I just kept saying, there's something wrong.

And at that point my body just really -- I was

like pinned in the -- the more it shook, the worse it got.

And then it got to this point that this leg was doing this and it was on the edge of the brake, and the other foot, I was pushing so hard, the bottom of my foot was hurting, but this leg's doing this and I had my hand on the shifter and when I tried to take my hand off the shifter to just keep my foot from slipping off of that brake, 'cause there was no way I could have picked it back up on there. I couldn't release my hand, I couldn't release the hand here and now I don't know what's going on with me, I don't know why my body's doing this and it's just like feeding itself, it's making it worse, you know?

INVESTIGATOR GARDNER: Uh-huh.

MR. MISTLER: And I'm just -- I was just pinned.

And I'm looking ahead and I can't even know, at this point, I can't even move my head around to look into the mirror and that, you know, somewhere along before that I had adjusted that mirror out so I could get a better view of them and that.

And now I can't even -- I can't even move my head,
I'm just looking straight and I'm going, this is
ridiculous, you know. Why -- Why is your body doing
this, you know, what's going on.

And so they stood there, oh, a good, two to three minutes maybe, a couple minutes, I'd say maybe two minutes on that -- or possibly three minutes on that curb. And had they walked around there, then I couldn't even have gotten out of the damn truck. I mean, I was just pinned, you know. Pinned.

So they stood there on that curb and now I'm looking straight ahead and I can't -- I can't even look back over there at them. And then finally I'm able to move my body just enough to catch a view, look back over there again. And I don't see them.

So that sort of freed me up a little bit and I was able to move a little more and get a little bit better of a view and I couldn't see them, you know.

So now I thought, oh, they went back on inside, everything's fine. You really let yourself, you know, you really let, you know, yourself go crazy, here, Billy, you know. I'm going on vacation, you know, you get a little irritable and a little, you know, I thought maybe I was kinda blaming it on that. We were just getting ready to leave the next morning on vacation.

And so then my body really calmed down because they were gone and I figured they went back inside, they were all together and I'm just making a mountain

out of a molehill here. So then I leave the clutch out and I started to pull out and I thought I'm gonna look back just one more time and I look in the mirror and that's when I saw his back.

INVESTIGATOR GARDNER: Uh-huh.

MR. MISTLER: Now, I'm back -- I would have been -- the driver's door would have been there, this being the front of my truck, I would have been here, 'cause the tag of his car was right there. I would have been right about in that position.

So now I see his back, I don't see the kid at all. So I stopped again. So now they're in front of that car and they must have been in front of that car for maybe -- maybe two minutes, which is a long time and he was bending down, I guess, in that position for a good two minutes.

And while he was there, I'm looking this car over, you know, and I'm just looking around and the more — because this guy just didn't fit in this Caddy. Even though it was ten years old, this Caddy was in good shape. He didn't fit inside of this thing.

And I'm trying to make him fit, you know. So I'm looking for dents and dings, you know, I do like body work as a hobby, you know, and so I'm just looking in for — the more I look, the better this Caddy's

looking. I see no dents down this side, I see no dents, except in the bumper, there's a little dent in the rear bumper. And I remember thinking maybe what caused that dent. I said maybe a motorcycle run into, 'cause it was a dent that went like that, or he backed into a pole.

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So just, you know, it's just the way my mind's working, and I looked on the deck lid, because the inertia of the motorcycle would have carried it under the deck lid. And he would have had scrapes or something if a motorcycle had hit it, he probably backed into a pole is what he did.

The deck lid was here and the dent goes almost right up to the deck lid, but there was no -- no dents in this deck lid, I looked around the back widow for rust, because it should have been popping -- a ten year old car should have been popping around there. There was no rust on that and the car was in great shape.

And I remember thinking, I wanted to get out at that point and look at the other side of the car and maybe if it was ripped out that would have made it a beater and this guy would have fit in it. I'm trying to make him fit in this car and nothing I'm doing is making sense now.

In the meantime, I got Rocky back here who had to

be -- there was a gray van behind me and then Rocky would have been behind -- I call him Rocky because now this guy's getting out and he's walking up here calling me a son-of-a-bitch, I mean, he called me a son-of-a-bitch, move it you son-of-a-bitch, what are you waiting on, you son-of-a -- every ten or twelve seconds, you know, this guy's doing this, you know, and he's walking up, looking, you know, and he sees me looking in the mirror and I guess he thought I was staring at him, and, you know, and he's getting all huffy and puffy, and you know, and I'm not even trying to pay anything attention to him.

But what I'm thinking is if I have to get out of this truck, by this time my body's unlocked, I'm still shaking, but my body's unlocked.

So he walks around the front of the car and they walked real slow, it seemed like it took them forever. Right as he came around there, Adam had looked — they both walked around — Rocky was walking up there and I think Rock was — I think — kept walking up and he walked back to his car, he'd walk over here and look and see and he'd walk back and I'm watching him in the mirror, too, and he'd walk up, he's getting angry this guy, he wanted to know what the hell I'm doing sitting up here.

And now he's getting ready to come up there and he's getting ready to say something to me, like, you know -- he'd been calling me a son-of-a-bitch for the last, you know, few minutes or so. But I wasn't even paying attention, I wanted to catch this eyes kid's -- this kid's eyes when he walked around that corner.

And he come around that corner and he looked up at Otis and Otis took his hat and sort of like pushed it down. Well, I didn't like that, but I remember I did that to my own kid and that. So now I'm really watching, and I'm watching Adam's eyes, because I'm locked onto his eyes, I'm trying to read what this kid's thinking; is he scared, is he afraid or what. He wasn't crying, he wasn't -- you know, he may have looked a little confused, but he -- he didn't look scared, he wasn't crying.

And they were walking so slow, I mean, they came around there, he wasn't rushing, you know, they're just walking slow and he's smiled at him and I thought of my grandfather then, because I remember walking with him and looking up at him and him just smiling for no reason, not saying anything, just smiling. I remember that so clear and that really calmed me down. That started to say to me everything was -- was fine, because this guy isn't try to snatch this kid and get

in the car and run, hell, he's going extra, extra slow.

He's walking down -- they're walking -- I mean,

literally just like, you know, he's smiling down at the

-- Adam and that.

So then they walk up to here and Adam stopped there for a second and the kid just like climbed up into the car and that. And Adam -- Otis got in behind him and Adam was standing on the seat and that's when he walked towards those blades, and I remember thinking, you know, be careful, pop, you forgot about your garden equipment, you know, you're gonna cut your --cut the kid.

And then Adam turns around right as Otis was sitting — getting into the car and he was still — now he's like facing him, but he's standing on the seat. So now I don't know whether Adam sit down on his own or if he reached over and, you know, sweeped his feet out from underneath him, which I've did with my kid to make him sit down, you know, when he was that age.

And then Otis reaches over and takes that red ball hat off and he reaches back and he lays it on top of all this stuff that's in the back here.

INVESTIGATOR GARDNER: Uh-huh.

MR. MISTLER: And then he turned back towards the front. And I'm watching to see if he's holding the kid

down or the kid's arms are flaring or something like that and none of that.

So then after about three, maybe five -- maybe ten seconds, let's say, Otis reaches back, takes the ball hat and he shoves it down in between the seat. And I figure, well, he didn't want it to blow out the window --

INVESTIGATOR GARDNER: Right.

MR. MISTLER: -- was the only reason. And it was at that point I remember thinking, because I had thought of Christmas earlier, the red, the green, the red, the green -- you know, the red and the green, Adam's hat, and the pants, the other red and green was Otis' hair, which in the sunlight you see the red, and then the green teeth.

And when I had pulled around to the car, I had seen the green interior and I remember looking -- I just remember these little thoughts -- I looked around and I saw -- I was looking around for red, there was no red in there.

When he had did that, I remembered the thought I had earlier and said there's the red, which I don't know what that means, it doesn't really mean anything, it's just, you know, there's was little thoughts like you were pairing stuff up and that.

And at this point I'm pretty sure everything's fine, because now I'm watching to see if he's holding him down and he wasn't holding him down. I could see, you 'know, him starting the car, he's in no hurry, you know.

I started to pull here because I wanted him to be in that car a few -- maybe seconds or a little bit of time and see what his reaction was.

So I started to pull back here because now the parking lot's going nuts, I'm on the point -- this old lady's on the point for eight minutes and nobody blows their horn. I'm on the point for, you know, less than a minute and there -- the whole parking lot's erupted now. And I'm sitting there and I got this whole parking locked up and I'm not even sure why I got it locked up, except something in my gut kept saying there was something wrong. But the more I watched it, then I kept saying why would he -- why isn't that -- why wouldn't that be that lady's kid, you know.

And I kept saying, Billy, you're making a mountain out of a molehill here. There's nothing wrong.

INVESTIGATOR GARDNER: Uh-huh.

MR. MISTLER: And I still wasn't a hundred percent sure.

So I wanted to pull here, that would have left the

parking lot get unlocked, because until I moved, nobody was going anywhere. It was just that locked up.

I wanted to pull here and then I saw a car starting to come down here. I said, now if I pull there I'm gonna block, you know, traffic coming this way.

So then I looked over here and I see an open space, and it's only a few feet away, oh, thank God, you know, I already had my car started in that one, and I saw that space and I said, now, great, I can just — by the time I got over there, somebody had pulled into that space and the car that was coming down here, had pulled off anyway, so I could have parked either way.

So now I'm already moving now, you know, and that space somebody jumped right in front of me, so I went to the next section, which would have been here, the next section, there's still not -- looking down, the next one and the next one and by the time I finally found a space, it would have been -- if this is that door, it would have been in this section, but almost three-quarters of the way down.

I got out -- After I parked the truck, I got out and I ran back up to here, about like you would jog, I guess, you know, 'cause I'm still not sure what the hell I'm even seeing.

And I ran back up to there because I wanted to see now he would have been with this guy for a minute or two and if there's nothing wrong, if it is Uncle Buck, the kid would have been fine. That way I could have went up alongside of the car and looked in the car and seen the kid's reaction and he would have been with this guy for several minutes.

So when I got back up to here, the Caddy was gone. And I looked all around and then I walked over to get up onto the curb, just to give me that much more height and I looked all around and I couldn't see the Caddy.

INVESTIGATOR GARDNER: Uh-huh.

MR. MISTLER: I had no idea where he went.

He may have went around this corner and then he could have got out through the back part there. They may have got this straightened out where this guy backed up out of that, I don't know whether they had that straightened out or not.

Or I don't know where he went, you know.

INVESTIGATOR GARDNER: Okay.

MR. MISTLER: So then I stood up on that curb up here about four or five minutes maybe, I guess, I don't know, I was up there quite a while. And I was analyzing everything, I'm going, why wouldn't that kid

belong to that lady. Of course that had to be her kid, you know.

And -- And this guy looked so weird, he would have scared this kid. You know, I mean, this guy was so weird looking that day, that, you know, I'm thinking it would have scared this kid, this guy would have cried just at the sight of him unless he was a family member or something.

And then I'm standing there, I'm just trying to make sense of this whole thing and kept saying, why wouldn't that be that lady's kid. Of course that's that lady's kid.

INVESTIGATOR GARDNER: Uh-huh.

MR. MISTLER: This is Uncle Buck, he just came here and he picked him up, everything's fine and thank God I didn't release this junk yard dog on him, because at that one point after I'd become unlocked and the horns are blowing and everything and I wanted out of that truck. I mean, if this kid needed help, I was gonna be out of truck and it wasn't Bill the exterminator coming out of that truck, it was a junk yard dog I was gonna release on this guy.

And I literally was gonna grab him in a bear hug, spin him 90 degrees and drop to the ground and pile drive his head into the ground and probably break his

fuckin' arms. So I knew what would happen if I released that dog, so I had to be sure. I just had to be sure before I jump out of there and throw some guy to the fuckin' pavement, because I don't like the way he's dressed.

So I stood up on that curb and I'm thinking this over and now I think, thank God I didn't do that, because I know what I was gonna do to him. I know what I was gonna do, and thank God I didn't. Oh, thank God, everything's fine. You know, everything's fine.

You let yourself, you know, make a mountain out of a molehill, you know, there's nothing wrong, the kid wasn't pulling away, jerking or nothing. I thought, thank God.

So I walked back up to here, I went in the store and by the time I got in the store I was happy I didn't do anything, because I'm now I'm just so sure everything was just fine.

And I looked there for lantern bags, which were right inside this doorway, I mean, as soon as you walked in the door over here, about halfway up on the rack, and I got a couple lantern bags and then I went over here and looked at a badminton set and a few -- looked around a little bit.

INVESTIGATOR GARDNER: Right.

MR. MISTLER: And then I came back and there was a checkout counter, about like here. So I got in line on his checkout counter and there was like four or five people ahead of me. And that was back before they had the computer scanners and that and what they would do is list each number and, you know —

INVESTIGATOR GARDNER: Right. That's when this lady came out and she was screaming.

MR. MISTLER: Yeah, that's --

INVESTIGATOR GARDNER: Right.

MR. MISTLER: I had --

(Thereupon, Tape 1, Side 1 concluded.)

(Thereupon, the following was heard on Tape 1, Side 2.)

MR. MISTLER: -- there maybe -- I've been in the store maybe eight or ten minutes.

INVESTIGATOR GARDNER: Uh-huh.

MR. MISTLER: And about that time, and it -- there was a -- the main walkway went up through this way and this would have been a walkway that went this way. And then lady come screaming through here, you know, Cooter, Cooter, Cooter, and she kinda -- I'm like -- there's like four people ahead me and I'm really almost close to that door there.

And she's going Cooter, Cooter and then she spins

around -- It kinda reminded me, I used to fly them model airplanes, but her purse was literally straight out.

INVESTIGATOR GARDNER: Uh-huh.

MR. MISTLER: And she's spinning around and she don't know which way to go, you know, she's just like — you know, she don't know whether to run this way, this way, this way or what to do. She's just like spinning and she's hollering Cooter, Cooter.

And she's spinning this purse and then finally she stops and she throws the purse down and she bolts off running down this way. And now she's hollering, Cooter, Cooter, and you can hear it getting less -- In other words, you know, the further away she gets -- because now down over here there's a door and apparently she must have went out of the door, because you could hear it getting like Cooter, Cooter. And she must have went out of that door and hollered Cooter outside, because now -- now you can hear her running back up the aisles doing the same thing, but now it's getting louder as she's coming.

INVESTIGATOR GARDNER: Right.

MR. MISTLER: Her purse is still laying right here on the floor, you know, right where she threw it down at. Because me and the guy in line, we looked and

I think I might have said to him, you know, this is like Candid Camera or something, you know. You know, it's just a trick to see if, you know, some will go over and, you know, rifle through this purse or, you know, I bet there's no money in that or, you know.

And then she came up and now I'm thinking, she's on a one-day pass from a nut house and she got separated from her chaperons. That's the only thing that would explain this terror, you know.

And she wasn't very -- And I'm thinking, she isn't very stable and that's what I thought. I literally thought she was on a one-day pass from a nut house.

And she's yelling, Cooter, Cooter and she's spinning around and they had this table here, and I believe they had shirts on this table, and they didn't have them laying flat, they had them laying up like this and they, you know, they stack them. And she's just like thrashing herself on this — on this — on these shirts, this — the counter about the size of your desk.

INVESTIGATOR GARDNER: Uh-huh.

MR. MISTLER: And she's just like thrashing herself on this and she hollered Cooter and she'd spin around. Then about that time, two gray haired old women, looked like grandma types, come up here, and one

on this side of her and one that side and they were talking to her. And as they're talking to her, she calmed down some. I thought one of them was Cooter.

The other one reached over, picked up her purse, handed her her purse, she threw her purse down again, the old lady reached down picked up her purse this time and just held it. And she -- they were like talking.

Now she calmed down and she's talking to these two people and by that time I had gotten my change and paid for my thing and I thought, well, everything's fine there, you know. And boy what a strange day this turned out to be in Sears, you know.

So I just turned around and walked on out.

INVESTIGATOR GARDNER: All right. And as I understand from that point, I mean, you went back to Sears that day and then on vacation, came back the next week, you find out about Adam Walsh, don't really make any connection with anything until 1983, when the chief shows up on the TV announcing about this Otis Toole or Otis Toole individual and you -- as soon as you saw his picture, you recognized him as the guy.

MR. MISTLER: Oh, instantly.

INVESTIGATOR GARDNER: Okay.

MR. MISTLER: I was laying in bed --

INVESTIGATOR GARDNER: That's the guy that was

with the Cadillac.

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MR. MISTLER: That was in the guy in the white Cadillac.

See, I went away on vacation --

INVESTIGATOR GARDNER: Right.

MR. MISTLER: -- and we came back the following Sunday and that, and before we even got out of the truck, some of the neighborhood boys that knew my son, had run up there and said Adam Walsh is missing, you know, he's been missing.

And my wife and I said, oh, my God, because we were up at Sears like between two and four on that afternoon and I had saw Mrs. Walsh, who I didn't make the connection because I thought the lady in the morning was Spanish.

INVESTIGATOR GARDNER: Right.

MR. MISTLER: And Mrs. Walsh said something to -to, I believe it was John, you know, where could he
be, you know.

INVESTIGATOR GARDNER: Exactly.

MR. MISTLER: And so that's why I didn't think those two people were connected at all, because I thought that was Spanish.

Because when I had went home, I went out to the motorcycle shop, I had picked up a chain and some other

parts I'd ordered for them ATC's and then I went back home and I told my wife about this story, you know, and I kept asking her, what does Cooter mean and she didn't know what Cooter meant.

And there was an old lady that — that used to walk up and down, you know, on our street and we would like talk and we knew she spoke Spanish, but not very good English, and I even wanted to go to see if, you know, I could go to her and find out what the hell Cooter meant.

INVESTIGATOR GARDNER: Uh-huh.

MR. MISTLER: I was that curious what Cooter meant, you know.

INVESTIGATOR GARDNER: All right.

MR. MISTLER: So, then we went ahead and went on our vacation, we left about probably five o'clock in the morning --

INVESTIGATOR GARDNER: Right.

MR. MISTLER: -- which would have been normal so we can get out of Broward County and that before the traffic gets bad.

We got up to Nashville (phonetic) Forest, it usually takes about five hours, you know.

INVESTIGATOR GARDNER: Okay. What I'd like to do today on this test, the question -- a lot of the

questions are gonna be the same questions you heard before.

MR. MISTLER: Uh-huh.

INVESTIGATOR GARDNER: Okay? It's a similar type test, I'm still interested in these same type issues.

I want to direct a couple questions a little more specific towards exactly what you're telling me. Let me just change a couple of words here.

Let me review all the questions with you.

MR. MISTLER: Okay.

INVESTIGATOR GARDNER: Once again, I'll do it them in -- with types, and they're really simple questions.

If you'd just answer these out loud.

Were you born in Kentucky?

MR. MISTLER: Yes.

INVESTIGATOR GARDNER: Do most people call you Bill?

MR. MISTLER: Yes.

INVESTIGATOR GARDNER: Is today Thursday?

MR. MISTLER: No.

INVESTIGATOR GARDNER: Is today Wednesday?

MR. MISTLER: Yes.

INVESTIGATOR GARDNER: I have my days mixed up.

MR. MISTLER: You're looking forward to the weekend.

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INVESTIGATOR GARDNER: No, I just had a week like you read about. We even worked Monday, it was a holiday, and I just kinda -- we're the only ones that worked in the whole courthouse, so it just kinda throws -- when those weeks happen, sometimes it just throws your day calendar off.

So, okay. Did you ever go to school?
MR. MISTLER: Yes.

INVESTIGATOR GARDNER: And are you completely convinced I will only ask you questions on this test we have reviewed?

MR. MISTLER: Yes.

INVESTIGATOR GARDNER: Okay. I'm just reviewing old questions

Okay. Regarding the abduction of Adam Walsh, do you intend to answer the questions about that truthfully?

MR. MISTLER: Yes.

INVESTIGATOR GARDNER: Did you lie when you said that you personally observed Otis Toole in a dark over white Cadillac in July of 1981?

MR. MISTLER: No.

INVESTIGATOR GARDNER: Did you lie when you said that you personally observed Otis Toole put a young boy in his dark over white Cadillac in July of 1981?

MR. MISTLER: No.

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INVESTIGATOR GARDNER: And once again, I'm gonna get into a couple of questions regarding your veracity and truthfulness, we've already discussed that before. That type of question needs to be included in this test.

Between the ages and 26 and 30, do you remember ever telling a serious lie to someone who trusted you?

MR. MISTLER: No.

INVESTIGATOR GARDNER: Okay. And other than what you have told me, because you mentioned a couple things about when you were younger, during the first 30 years of your life, do you remember ever lying to someone in authority?

MR. MISTLER: The first 30 thirty years?

INVESTIGATOR GARDNER: Yes.

MR. MISTLER: Well, I'm sure I did, yeah.

INVESTIGATOR GARDNER: Well, you told me there was a time right around when you were nineteen --

MR. MISTLER: Well, from nineteen -- The way you asked it last time, from nineteen to 30.

INVESTIGATOR GARDNER: No. I asked -- The first question is 26 to 30 and this one's during the first 30 years.

MR. MISTLER: No, I mean, when we met last time I

thought it was like --

INVESTIGATOR GARDNER: No, I got the question sheet right over here.

Is it a problem then?

MR. MISTLER: No, I just remember that question from last week was 19 to 30, because I did time and I got out and I might have lied to people beforehand.

INVESTIGATOR GARDNER: This is the first sheet from the first day, this is the second. I just copied -- I copied them back over the same way.

'Cause put other than what you told me, because I remember you specifically told me there were a couple instances around the time when you were maybe eighteen, nineteen --

MR. MISTLER: Yeah, I did time for strong-armed robbery.

INVESTIGATOR GARDNER: Right. You got bounced around a little bit with the police --

MR. MISTLER: Yeah.

INVESTIGATOR GARDNER: -- and you're sure that you lied to them.

But you said other than that incident, you had never lied to anybody in authority.

MR. MISTLER: No. No. No.

INVESTIGATOR GARDNER: So that's why I'm prefacing

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this, but I am doing the whole 30 years of your life, first 30.

The question is, other than what you have told me about during the first 30 years of your life, did you ever lie to someone in authority?

MR. MISTLER: No.

INVESTIGATOR GARDNER: Okay. And another question will be, is there something else you're afraid of I'll ask you a question about during this test?

MR. MISTLER: No.

INVESTIGATOR GARDNER: Okay. The -- The incidents that you've told me about today, the -- when I -- the follow-up information I've gathered, you know, from last week to today, (inaudible) vacation, you know, age, (inaudible) illnesses or anything I asked you, there's nothing to suggest there's anything has created you to be in a situation now where you would be unsuitable to do the test.

I do have to put a make-up lie in every -- in every test series that I do, just to confirm that you're -- that you are responding and reacting as you should.

For the purposes of this test, what I'd like you to do is pick a letter between C and H.

MR. MISTLER: D.

INVESTIGATOR GARDNER: Okay. For this test I will 1 ask you in alphabetical order. Did you pick the letter B, did you pick the letter C, did you pick the letter E, D --MR. MISTLER: D. INVESTIGATOR GARDNER: -- E and F. Okay. MR. MISTLER: Yeah. And you want me to answer --8 INVESTIGATOR GARDNER: Truthfully to every 9 question, except the one you picked. 10 MR. MISTLER: You want me to lie on D? 11 INVESTIGATOR GARDNER: Yes, sir. 12 MR. MISTLER: Okay. 13 INVESTIGATOR GARDNER: So I'll say did you pick 14 the letter B? 15 MR. I just came here -- You know, when you get done here, you want either a yes or no, you know --

INVESTIGATOR GARDNER: I understand. And I'm not trying to leave --

MR. MISTLER: But I understand your side too.

INVESTIGATOR GARDNER: -- you hear disappointed.

I -- This is too important to --

MR. MISTLER: Oh, I know.

INVESTIGATOR GARDNER: You know, so that's why I am where I am.

What I would like you to do -- I don't know you, the detectives here, you know, Detective Smith and Mr. Rick, none of us really know you, okay, we don't know your background or anything else. And what I'm -- what I'm trying to say, there's a lot of different things that can cause problem -- that can cause memories to reflect a difference in what actually might have been to what -- to what is perceived fourteen years later as it definitely was.

And I need you to do some self-analysis and that kind of thing just between now and the next time we talk to you about this, if you would.

MR. MISTLER: Uh-huh.

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INVESTIGATOR GARDNER: It's --

MR. MISTLER: What do you mean?

INVESTIGATOR GARDNER: Well, there's -- Okay. I understand.

MR. MISTLER: Give me an example.

INVESTIGATOR GARDNER: Well, an example is, you've seen the old story, you've probably haven't experienced in your own life, but I know back in school, I can remember when I was in grade school, one thing they would — they'd tell somebody in the back corner of the room a sentence and then ask them to tell the next person —

MR. MISTLER: Yeah, by the time it gets to the front it's --

INVESTIGATOR GARDNER: It doesn't even relate to what happens there.

MR. MISTLER: Yeah.

INVESTIGATOR GARDNER: Well, we can do the same things to ourselves individually, okay, over a period of time, reflecting back on something, reflecting back on something. Picking up on a thought, well, this was — Yeah, there was this thing, too, when maybe this thing — this thing, too, wasn't necessarily with this incident, it was with a similar incident but they can flow in to it.

And it's just a possibly. And those things can happen.

All I'm asking you to do is just do some serious self-analysis of the incident. Don't try -- I'm not asking you to dig up new facts about what happened back in 1981, I'm just asking you to do some -- do some -- do some sincere self-analysis of all the times you'd thought about this over the years and try to -- try to, as best you can take yourself back, and this is a damn difficult thing to do, but try to put a filter up there and filter out everything from -- from February 21st, 1996 back to the first week of August 1981, and try to see -- try to look at that, you know, when you first came back from that camping trip when you heard that.

MR. MISTLER: Uh-huh.

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INVESTIGATOR GARDNER: When you came home from Sears that day, you talked to your wife. Try to look at that because there's been a lot of things that you have, from what you told me last time, there's a lot of things that you have come up with that -- that has -- your memory's been jogged and you've come up with it; the license plate number --

MR. MISTLER: Uh-huh.

INVESTIGATOR GARDNER: -- and things of that sort, that has come to you years after the fact.

So the things -- And if there's -- The problem we have in polygraph and the reason I'm asking you to do this, if there's things that have come into your memory of that, okay, that may not necessarily have been accurate, but you have rehashed it in your mind and rehashed it in your mind so it becomes part of your scenario of that event, and you consciously -- you consciously have been relating that story to Detective Smith and to Mr. Ray and myself.

MR. MISTLER: It'd be the same story, Terry, a month from now --

INVESTIGATOR GARDNER: Okay. I'm just asking you, that's all I can do is ask.

MR. MISTLER: Yeah.

INVESTIGATOR GARDNER: You know, I'm just -- you know, I'm just --

MR. MISTLER: It's -- Really it's crystal clear in my mind.

INVESTIGATOR GARDNER: Okay.

MR. MISTLER: You know, I have no problem with it. I really don't.

INVESTIGATOR GARDNER: Okay

 $\ensuremath{\mathsf{MR}}.$ MISTLER: I have nothing gain by making the story up like this.

INVESTIGATOR GARDNER: I'm not suggesting you do.

I'm just trying -- You see, I have a problem in polygraph, I have to try to -- once a test is over with, I can read the charts and I can come to a conclusion and then when the conclusion doesn't match up with the story I've been told, like it did last week, I'm at a loss.

MR. MISTLER: Yeah.

INVESTIGATOR GARDNER: 'Cause I don't have a crystal ball.

MR. MISTLER: No, I can appreciate that.

INVESTIGATOR GARDNER: If my equipment came with a crystal ball, I'd be -- I'd be in fat city. I'd crank that baby up right now, you know, I'd ask you a few questions, (inaudible) and I'd have the answers written right inside. I don't have that.

All I have is you and me to discuss it -- MR. MISTLER: Yeah.

INVESTIGATOR GARDNER: -- you know, until we can figure out what the hell's causing, you know, the charts to react the way they are. And the charts are only a reproduction of what's happening inside of you.

MR. MISTLER:

INVESTIGATOR GARDNER: You know, and that's what -- that's what I have to interpret.

Yeah.

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Today's thing, though, like I say, I don't want to address anything, 'cause I want to take a long, hard look at these, I'm gonna put some good numbers to them. I have an associate I want to show a couple things to just get an independent opinion, just on charts. Take a look, what do you think.

You know, I've been doing it twelve years, you know, and I trust my opinion, this one associate, he's brought stuff to me before. You know, you get (inaudible), hey, you ever seen anything like this before, exactly what do you think, you know. You don't even tell him what you've got, just let them look at it and see what they come up with.

And I really want to do that with this.

MR. MISTLER: Yeah, that's fine with me. But like I say, it's certain little things that made me lock in

INVESTIGATOR GARDNER: Uh-huh.

MR. MISTLER: -- what I, you know, what I remember.

INVESTIGATOR GARDNER: Right.

MR. MISTLER: Yeah, I remember --

INVESTIGATOR GARDNER: But I have been -- I have been told by those that are closely involved in this case, that it is documented from the day that that little boy was missing, that Adam was missing, he didn't have a hat on. I mean, that was way back then, and I remember your comment last week, something to the

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effect, you don't care if his mother said he did or didn't.

MR. MISTLER: (Inaudible) mother said, really.

INVESTIGATOR GARDNER: So, you know, I don't doubt

-- I see the sincerity in your eye when you tell me

that and when you make the comments about it after the

test even last week, but in the same respect, that is

one -- one factual thing --

MR. MISTLER: Well, he was -- I'll tell you, it was an adult's hat. It isn't the hat that you see on him in the paper.

INVESTIGATOR GARDNER: Uh-huh.

MR. MISTLER: It was an adult size hat, because it came right down to here. Now, whether he went to the mall with a different hat on and maybe his dad had a hat that was in that car, you know, maybe his dad was a couch, I don't know.

You know, I mentioned that to Detective Smith

also, but that is so crystal clear in my mind that -whether it's ten years from now, it'll still be the
same because, I mean, of the different little pieces
that lock that in.

INVESTIGATOR GARDNER: Right.

MR. MISTLER: You know, where you!ll remember one little piece and then that locks in two or three different things.

INVESTIGATOR GARDNER: Right. Like I said, I'm not --

MR. MISTLER: Yeah, no, I can appreciate it.

INVESTIGATOR GARDNER: -- I'm not questioning your sincerity when you say it 'cause I can see in your eye when you're telling me the whole story, but that is just one little thing that, from what I've been told from those who have lived this case --

Begins his description of the driver - hair stood up like an antenna, made eye-contact and he thought "upright animal, mini-big foot, circus." A red tint to the hair. Teeth were "green as grass." Reminded him of Christmas and a 8th grande school-mate Jessie McKnight who had green teeth.
52-53	The subject gets out and he sees him talking to "Adam." Traffic is backed up into the street.
53	Discusses other boys and a woman standing in the area. Refers to the man as "Ottis."
54	Woman looks at man like she knew him. He refers to the man as "Uncle Buck." The old woman in front of him drives forward, he looks back and the woman and children are gone.
55	Stopped straight across from his seat and could look into the inside of the Cadillac. Describes that he is now feeling something is wrong.

65-66	Describes "Adam" walking with "Ottis". He thinks the scene is like he and his own grandfather. They enter car and he refers to gardening tools (see also page 57-58).
67	He insists that the boy had on a red hat. Vehicle had a green interior.
72	Parked his car and by then the vehicle was gone.
74-76	Describes a woman yelling "Cooter, Cooter" and running down the aisle. Woman slams her purse down to the floor and runs off. She returns and throws herself down on a bable of shirts, two old women come and calm her down.
76-78	Describes returning to the store between 2 and 4 P.M. with his wife and son. Sees a blond woman crying, John WALSH, a police officer, and an unidentified man. Hears a page for Adam WALSH and then they leave the store.
